



Forthcoming judgments and decisions

The European Court of Human Rights will be notifying in writing two judgments on Tuesday 3 September 2024 and 86 judgments and / or decisions on Thursday 5 September 2024.

Tuesday 3 September 2024

[Shlosberg v. Russia \(application no. 32648/22\)](#)

The applicant, Lev Markovich Shlosberg, is a Russian national who was born in 1963 and lives in Pskov (Russia).

The case concerns an opposition politician who, in 2021, was registered as a candidate in the elections to the State Duma (the lower house of the Russian Parliament). Several days later, he was disqualified from standing for having taken part in a demonstration called by an organisation classified as extremist by the Russian authorities. His appeals against that decision were unsuccessful.

Before the Court, he complains about the annulment of his registration as a candidate in the elections. He relies on Article 3 of Protocol No. 1 (right to free elections) to the European Convention on Human Rights and Article 18 (limitation on use of restrictions on rights) of the European Convention.

Thursday 5 September 2024

[Mukhtarli v. Azerbaijan and Georgia \(no. 39503/17\)](#)

The applicant, Mr Afgan Sabir oglu Mukhtarli, is an Azerbaijani national who was born in 1974 and lives in Germany.

The case concerns the alleged abduction, ill-treatment and covert transfer of the applicant, a well-known Azerbaijani journalist, from Georgia to Azerbaijan in 2017, and his subsequent arrest and pre-trial detention there. He asserts that these actions were intended to silence him and to punish him for his journalistic activities.

As regards Georgia, the applicant complains about his alleged abduction, ill-treatment and forcible transfer to Azerbaijan, and the relevant authorities' failure to conduct an effective investigation in that regard. As regards Azerbaijan, the applicant alleges that his arrest and detention there was unlawful and unjustified. He relies on Articles 3 (abduction associated with ill-treatment and lack of effective investigation), 5 §§ 1 (c), 3 and 4 (right to liberty and security), 8 (right to respect for private and family life), 10 (freedom of expression), 13 (right to an effective remedy) and 18 (limitation on use of restrictions on rights) of the Convention and Article 2 of Protocol No. 4 (freedom of movement) and Article 1 of Protocol No. 7 (procedural safeguards relating to expulsion of aliens) to the Convention. As far as the actual abduction is concerned, the applicant's relevant complaints, under Articles 3 and 5 of the Convention, concern only Georgia.

The Court will give its rulings in writing on the following cases, some of which concern issues which have already been submitted to the Court, including excessive length of proceedings.
