



## Court launches series of new factsheets

The European Court of Human Rights is launching a series of five new factsheets on its case-law on the following themes: [access to the Internet and the freedom to receive and impart information](#); [deprivation of citizenship](#); [legal professional privilege](#); and [accompanied](#) and [unaccompanied](#) migrant minors in detention.

Since September 2010 the Court has published on its website about 60 factsheets providing the reader with a rapid overview of the most relevant cases concerning a particular topic, regularly updated to reflect developments in its case-law. Many have been translated into various languages, including German, Croatian, Greek, Italian, Polish, Romanian, Russian, Spanish and Turkish, with the support of, among others, the States concerned and national human-rights institutions. The factsheets aim to contribute to increasing awareness about the Court's judgments among journalists, national authorities and the public in the Member States of the Council of Europe with a view to improving implementation of the European Convention on Human Rights at national level. One of the key demands of the current reform plans to increase the effectiveness of the Convention system is for Member States to guarantee domestic implementation of the Convention and its case-law.

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**The European Court of Human Rights** was set up in Strasbourg by the Council of Europe Member States in 1959 to deal with alleged violations of the 1950 European Convention on Human Rights.
